Sakitsu Village in Amakusa

Sakitsu Village is a fishing village with a scenic ocean view, featuring the iconic Sakitsu Church at its center. It is one of the locations of the World Cultural Heritage site, "Hidden Christian Sites in the Nagasaki Region." Moreover, it is the first fishing village landscape designated as a cultural landscape of national importance.

Sakitsu Village

Hidden Christians in the region maintained a unique form of Christianity adapted to the lifestyle of their villages while coexisting with traditional Japanese religions, such as Shinto and Buddhism. Sakitsu Village preserves and conveys this history to the present day.



Sakitsu Church

Established in 1934, French missionary Father Halbout cooperated with local residents to aid in the construction of the church. It was constructed on the site where the practice of "efumi" — where suspected Christians were forced to step on Christian icons to prove they were not followers— was once conducted. The church is a Gothic style cathedral with tatami mat floors, a feature that is very rare even in Japan.

Sakitsu Suwa Shrine

Established in 1647, Suwa Shrine was the center of an incident known as "Amakusa Kuzure," where a number of Hidden Christians were revealed one after another in 1805. Hidden Christians would visit this shrine and chant the prayer "anmenriyusu (Amen Deus)" on a daily basis. The site of the former Sakitsu Church is located near the shrine.

Toya

Narrow paths between houses that provide access to the sea. There are multiple Toyas in the village.



Kake

Decks jutting out over the sea, built on houses by the water. They are used for anchoring boats and sun-drying fish.



Sakitsu Tourist Information Center (Road Station Sakitsu)

The main hub for information about Sakitsu Village. It provides travel details, exhibits on the Christian history of Sakitsu and Imatomi, and local products for purchase. The center offers ample parking, a 24-hour restroom, and bicycle rentals.

History and Culture of Christianity in Amakusa

Christianity was introduced to Amakusa by Portuguese missionaries approximately 450 years ago. The history of its prosperity, persecution under the ban, and subsequent revival is still preserved and passed down today.



Oe Church

The first church to be built in Amakusa after the ban on Christianity was lifted. The current building was established in 1933 with the cooperation of local Christians under the guidance of French missionary Father Garnier, who dedicated his life to missionary work in Amakusa.

Gutenberg's Press (Replica)

A printing press brought back by the four young envoys of the Tenshō Embassy to Europe, who studied at the educational institution 'Amakusa Collegio' established to train Japanese missionaries. In order to train Japanese missionaries, works of literature such as 'The Tale of the Heike' and 'Aesop's Fables' were printed and published as 'Amakusa Books'.

A flag used by the rebel forces during the Shimabara-Amakusa Rebellion. The design in the center features a chalice and a sacred rice cake. It has been designated as an Important Cultural Item by the Japanese government. *A replica is usually on display.

Dinosaur Island

Amakusa is made up of 120 islands of various sizes, and holds approximately 100 million years of geological history. The museum features the first lower jaw fossil of a tyrannosaurus rex discovered in Japan, along with many other rare fossils. These collections are of significant academic interest.



Reopened on March 20, 2024, the museum features a wide range of exhibits, including fossils discovered in Amakusa, complete dinosaur skeletons, and displays of living organisms.




Japan's First Excavation

Tyrannosaurus rex Jaw Fossil

Fossilized lower jaw fragments of a tyrannosaurus rex, excavated for the first time in Japan. The dinosaur is estimated to have been around 8 to 9 meters long. While it is slightly smaller compared to other tyrannosaurus rexes, it is still large for a bipedal carnivorous dinosaur (theropod).




Sauropod Rib Fossil

A fragment of a rib bone from the right side of a sauropod. The dinosaur is estimated to have reached an overall length of about 15 meters, making it one of the largest sauropods ever found in Japan.

Coryphodon Jaw Fossil

Coryphodon lower jawbone fragments. Dating back 49 million years, these are the oldest fossils in Japan. Rib fossils were also found at the same site.



Herbivorous Dinosaur Foot Fossil

Discovered in Goshoura-machi in 1997, this is the first dinosaur fossil found in Amakusa. It is a shin bone of a herbivorous dinosaur, but the exact species has not been identified.

Dolphin Watching

The waters off Tsuji-shima Island in Amakusa are home to a school of around 200 Indo-Pacific bottlenose dolphins. The area is rich with small fish that serve as food for dolphins, thanks to its unique seafloor and currents. Furthermore, the traditional practice of free-diving (rather than using nets) has allowed wild dolphins to thrive here. Because dolphins form protective groups that keep sharks away, free-diving can be conducted safely. Amakusa is beautiful place where humans and dolphins coexist.

The main reception for dolphin watching tours. The facility also provides information digitally to learn more about dolphins. Additionally, there is a restaurant that works with local fisheries and a products sales corner for locally sourced goods.

Mt. Kuratake




The Ficus Superba Tree of Sibiratubaki Park







Ushibuka Haiya Festival

Ushibuka Area | Third Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of April

The Ushibuka Haiya festival is a dance festival that celebrates the coming of spring, and is held every April in Ushibuka. The Haiya-style folk songs found throughout Japan are thought to have originated from the 'Ushibuka Haiya Song.' The festival features events such as the 'So-Odori,' where people of all ages dance together through the streets of Ushibuka chanting "Sassa Yoy-yoy," and the 'Fishing Fleet Maritime Parade.' Every year these activities attract large crowds from within Kumamoto and beyond, creating a lively atmosphere.

Amakusa Hondo Haiya Festival

Hondo Area | Late April to end of September

One of the two major Haiya festivals in Amakusa, this event features participants dressed in matching yukata parading through the streets to the lively rhythm of the Haiya song.



Amakusa Romantic Fantasy

Various Locations | Late November to end of January

Magical lights brighten up Amakusa's winter season.



Amakusa Iris Festival at Nishinokubo Park

Hondo Area | Late May to early June

Approximately 250,000 irises bloom in the unique iris garden set amidst terraced rice fields.



Sazanami Festa

Ariake Area | Middle of July

Highlights include exciting stage events and a maritime fireworks show, with a sand art festival also taking place at the same time.



Ushibuka Akane Ichi

Ushibuka Area | Early December

Named after the local Ushibuka dialect term 'akane suru,' meaning 'a large catch' or 'good job,' this festival includes many events, such as sea bream fishing, while also having local markets.



Shimoda Onsen Festival

Amakusa Area | Late April

The 'Oyu Kake Mikoshi,' festival is a very lively event where women in traditional festival garb carry a portable shrine while being splashed with hot spring water.



Sumoto Taiko Odori (Important Cultural Property)

Sumoto Area | Third Saturday and Sunday of October/ Second Saturday and Sunday of November

A traditional dance performed by the Sumoto youth passed down for over 300 years.



Amakusa Marathon

Hondo・Itsuwa Area | Late January

Boasting scenic courses with views of Mount Unzen-Fugen in Nagasaki Prefecture, anyone participating may run either a full or half marathon.

Pure white porcelain, showcasing Amakusa's rich history of pottery. With techniques going back hundreds of years and new artists making works with their own unique flair and techniques, Amakusa is a haven for all pottery lovers.



Amakusa Ceramics Exhibition

Hondo Area | Early November

Artists from across the country gather to display and sell their ceramics. The event features pottery wheel workshops and has many works created based on that year's theme on display.



Amakusa Pottery Stones

The ore mined for ceramics here on the west coast of Amakusa is said to be quite rare, even by a global standard. Hiraga Gennai, a famous artist and creator of pottery during the Edo-period would go so far as to say that it was "a product of unparalleled quality." This type of stone is abundant here in Amakusa, accounting for approximately 80% of all stones of this quality produced in Japan. This stone is shipped to various ceramics-producing regions outside Kumamoto. Products made from this stone are notable for their high strength, translucency, and beautiful white finish.

Amakusa Chanpon

One of Japan's three major chanpons, alongside Nagasaki's "Nagasaki Chanpon" and "Obama Chanpon," Amakusa Chanpon is a unique local specialty. It can be enjoyed not only at chanpon specialist shops but also at diners, izakayas, and coffee shops.



Bakudan (Bomb)

What a Striking Name!
A deep-fried fish cake with an egg inside, often enjoyed during celebrations and traditional New Year's meals.

Ganeage (Fried Crab)

A dish made from sweet potatoes cut into sticks, coated in batter, and deep-fried into palm-sized pieces. In Amakusa dialect, 'gane' means crab. The dish is said to have gotten its name from its shape, which is that of a crab. It is served on ceremonial occasions, and as a snack. When it's freshly fried, it has a crispy exterior and a fluffy interior, making it absolutely delicious.



Akamaki

A local specialty of Ushibuka, Akamaki is resemblant of a Swiss roll filled with red bean paste and wrapped in mochi. It originated as a lucky charm for fishermen, and was also part of their rations they took to sea.

Koppa-mochi

In the local dialect of Amakusa, dried sweet potato is known as "koppa." Koppa-mochi is a snack made by pounding this dried sweet potato with sticky rice. Lightly roasting this tasty treat makes it even more delicious.


Enjoy a selection of eight dishes featuring the Ariake octopus, with the octopus steak being the most popular.

Experience a delightful array of sweets and dishes made with Amakusa Bankan citrus, renowned for its refreshing tartness and balanced sweetness.


